- Employed in 2-phyisician owner DPC clinic
- 2-year contract
- Contract extension negotiations become termination
- Open SparksMD Family Medicine
  - 1 Physician solo practice, Sole Owner
- 2.5 years, full panel, expansion vs closing panel?



## **Employed DPC Experience**

- Pros:
  - No overhead/risk
  - Salary stability?
  - Focus on patient care
  - Mentorship and time to learn
- Cons:
  - · Limits to autonomy
  - Less say in growth/branding
  - Mismatch in vision/values



## Owning a DPC

#### • Pros:

- Full control: hours, pricing, services, technology, office snacks
- Brand control
- Income potential, equity

#### • Cons:

- Business risk/startup cost
- Marketing, management, operational skills
- Stress of ownership
- So many hats to wear
